

Bob Prince has collected enough plastic to get us two lovely benches on the porches at the CPG house and the next one will go to the Smith Cafe.



FROM THE EDEN PRAIRIE HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

Robert Bowes and Paul Thorp are Board Members for both the Eden Prairie Historic Preservation Commission, and the Eden Prairie Historical Society. The main goal of both organizations is to "foster an understanding and appreciation for historic preservation" of Eden Prairie's people, places, and historic artifacts. Projects that are currently being addressed by both organizations include **The Flying Red Horse, Historic Train Depot, the Grist Mill Site and Camp Eden Wood (Glen Lake's Children Home).**



The Flying Red Horse was installed on top of the Mobil gas station in 1936 and it was located at the intersection of Mn Highway 5 and US 169. In 1939 G. Gordon Smith bought the gas station from The Deep Rock Oil Corporation. Jesse Schwartz started working at the gas station in 1933 and he bought it from G. Gordon Smith in 1972. The gas station also included the Wye Cafe, named that because of the "Y" created by eastwest MN Hwy 5 joining US 169 north-south. In 1978 a new gas station was built by Schwartz and the Wye café was replaced by a Country Kitchen Restaurant. At this time, the Flying Red Horse was taken down. Thanks to the Schwartz family it was donated to the City of Eden Prairie and was stored in a secure city building. Take my word for it, there has been much discussion about The Flying Red Horse and where he or she should reside. Well, the city of Eden Prairie, in conjunction with the EPHS and the EPHPC have found it new a home. It will be installed at the corner of Flying Cloud Drive (old 169) and Town Center Place, across from Discount Tires, same side as the Redstone Restaurant. The plan is to have it installed by the end of 2024. The Flying Red

Horse will be elevated for a better light rail visual and will include information signage, and a plaza area for enjoyment. Perfect location for honoring a true Eden Prairie legend!

The site of the former **Historic Train Depot** is located just east of Eden Prairie Rd. and just north of Hwy 212 (across from main entrance to Miller Park). In 1871 the Minneapolis and St. Louis RR built a railroad that ran through Eden Prairie. A small depot and large water tank were constructed to service this stretch of railroad. The trains were steam engines that burned wood and needed water every one hundred miles, both structures were torn down in the 1940s and the RR tracks are also long gone. The old railroad is now part of the Minnesota River Bluffs Trail system.





In the last few years, the City of Eden Prairie built a large underground water storage unit with a building to look like the Historic Train Depot. It is directly across the trail from the original Depot. This site is slated for local designation as a historic site. The EPHPC and the EPHS will be working this summer clearing brush from the area while searching for artifacts. This area is accessible to the public by walking, biking, or parking at Miller Park and using the crosswalk on Eden Prairie Rd.

The Grist Mill site was built in 1865 at Pioneer Trail and Purgatory Creek. It was a small mill that operated until about 1880. Other than two stone foundations, nothing else exists that is

associated with the operation of the mill. This summer the EPHPC will clean up lawn clippings and litter around the foundations.

The EPHS recently received a **table donated by the Rogers/Nicklay family** of Eden Prairie. This is not just any table. It was in the old library in the Eden Prairie School built in 1924, and used for School Board meetings. The table eventually migrated to the bus garage in the 1940's. When the district purchased a new bus, John Rogers acquired the table. For many years it was stored at Harry and Evelyn's home. Their daughter Phyllis moved it to her townhouse in Bloomington after her parents passed. Eventually it was moved to her daughter's home and Nancy and her son donated it to the Historical Society this winter in hopes that it could return to the old Consolidated school for the 100 year celebration. Paul has been repairing the table.



CONT. HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

The **Glen Lake Children's Camp** was built in 1925 and treated children who had tuberculosis. The camp closed in 1950 and is on the National Register of historic sites. Hennepin County decided in 1983 to give the facility to the City of Eden Prairie, with the stipulation it would be utilized for people with special needs. Now called Camp Eden Wood, the city leases it to **True Friends**, a nonprofit organization providing educational programs, retreats and activities for children and adults with special needs. In 1925 a stone monument was dedicated to Mr. and Mrs. George Christian, who founded the camp. The monument was restored to its original condition in 2019.





Paul Thorp, one of our Board Members, finished the project by painting the letters on the monument, the completion being the result of a collaborative effort between Eden Prairie Community Foundation, EPHS, EPHPC, and the MN State Historical Preservation office.

Last month True Friends received a grant from Eden Prairie Lions for \$15,000 to begin the process of restoration of the former Birchwood Dining Hall, into a multi-purpose community room for various programs and activities. This will be a long-term project that will include the efforts of all the above-listed organizations. Birchwood dining hall is the original 1925 Mess Hall, with its Rumford fireplace, original windows, and flooring. The improvements will keep the Hall's integrity. How is that for teamwork?
